Weeds, weeds, and more weeds!

With the onset of our typical hot, August days, weed growth is prolific...

One of the ways to keep your yard looking weed free takes some preparation. And if you perform your own yard maintenance, the following is a recommendation for two products to help with the invasive irritations that seem to sprout up in the tiniest of crevices in your landscaping.

As part of our neighborhood beautification, we homeowners must control the weeds on our property and one area that all homeowners battle is the courtesy strip between the sidewalk and the street. Some of you have grass and irrigate it, others have a rock mulch and most everyone is fighting the weeds this time of year.

One recommendation is a product from Otho called GroundClear found at most hardware or farm and home stores. GroundClear has been specifically formulated to kill all types of plants that are green and growing. Use it to kill weeds on hardscapes, in landscape beds, and (carefully) around vegetable gardens. This product claims to keep your rock mulch clear for 12 months. You can apply this product in your rock mulch and pathways in early April and spot treat as needed. Make sure to follow the recommended mixture and application instructions. This product **should NOT be used** for spot treating lawn weeds, iit kills all vegetation.

For the weeds in your lawn, consider spraying a product in early spring formulated for broadleaf weed control. A product called Trimec with Crabgrass control from Gordons is an example. It comes in a concentrate as well as a premix and it is for control of grass weeds PLUS broadleaf weed control. It controls crabgrass and foxtail (quinclorac) PLUS dandelions and other broadleaf weeds (2-4D) in late spring and summer lawns. This product should not be applied to "new" or overseeded lawns until the new grass emerges and stabilizes.

Mow your grass often and cut it as high as you can. You want the good grass to crowd out the weeds! Cutting it high helps your grass survive the hot, dry weather and drought. Also, keep your mower blades sharp and water to about an 1" per week.

A nice weed free yard doesn't take much work, just some planning and the proper chemicals to keep it fertilized and weed free.
